NESA Region Trends – CYBER

- Reports of a successful test of a Chinese hypersonic missile have been received with mixed enthusiasm in the MENA region. Most regional states do not find it relevant other than as an indication of how major powers are engaged in various forms of technological competition. Yet, in Gulf security circles, the successful test received more fanfare, both as a potential regional risk and as a potential redefinition of how major actors operate in the region.
- Given investments by major powers in Artificial Intelligence and the promised enhanced capabilities that will result from data management to predictive modeling regional powers in the NESA AOR are beginning to take notice. The preference for security spending still remains in traditional tools and platforms, but the security dimensions of advanced computing are becoming a target for states with the financial means to obtain.
- Gulf powers remain keenly interested in autonomous systems and are engaging with major producers of such systems to gain greater familiarity. This includes purchasing autonomous systems and engaging in exercises with partner states that utilize autonomous systems. For example, Gulf partners are keen to cooperate with the U.S. Navy's Task Force 59 on unmanned maritime vehicles. Task Force 59, based in Bahrain, was stood up in September.
- COP26 has highlighted South Asia's increased interest in developing, acquiring, and deploying technologies intended to mitigate the impacts of climate change. Given the estimations of how climate will impact the region, South Asian regional states, particularly littoral states, increasingly view climate as a priority security risk. The COP26 event is a global United

Nations summit about climate change and how countries are planning to tackle it. COP stands for Conference of the Parties, and the summit will be attended by the countries that signed the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) – a treaty that came into force in 1994.

- The challenge of aerial drones throughout the Gulf and Levant persists. Regional experts have highlighted ongoing tensions near Syria over Turkish drones, the ongoing development of Iran's aerial drone production (and potential distribution to affiliated regional groups), and efforts to purchase aerial drones by various Gulf Kingdoms, namely the UAE, KSA, and Qatar.
- Integrated systems are further progressing in specific MENA region urban environments, with Dubai and Abu Dhabi leading the way. These 'smart cities' signify the depth of trade with major technological producers with specific MENA states, including China who has become the largest international advocate for 'smart city' systems.

MENA Regional Waters: Red Sea/Arabian Sea Smuggling Conundrum Workshop

The NESA Center hosted a two-day workshop on security challenges in the waters of the Middle East with a specific emphasis on the Red Sea and Arabian Sea. NESA was assisted in this effort with support from the Africa Center for Strategic Studies (ACSS). Esteemed representatives from regional countries and professionals in the maritime community gave lectures and contributed to valuable discussion about maritime security. Issues discussed included information sharing, countering maritime criminality, maritime domain awareness, and the necessity of enhancing trust among regional states. NESA Academic Dean, Dr. Roger Kangas, kicked off the workshop with welcome remarks and NESA Director, LTG (ret.) Terry Wolff provided final remarks and farewell thanks. Dr. Catherine Kelly of the Africa Center for Strategic Studies moderated a session focusing on African viewpoints on the Red and Arabian Seas. As in the past, this off-the-record track 1.5 event brought together a substantial number of senior serving/former military and civilian officials, sitting legislators and subject matter experts from India, Pakistan, and Afghanistan, as well as academics and officials from the UK and the U.S. No officials from Afghanistan participated this year, but we were able to draw on the insights of two influential non-Taliban political figures virtually; we also heard from a former Afghan parliamentarian and Doha negotiator who was present in person. 


