NESA Region Trends – SOUTH ASIA

- The ongoing and obvious climate alterations in South Asia are creating political momentum and a greater push for coordinated effort beyond the region itself. No longer a 'theoretical' problem, the regional states are advocating for more comprehensive environmental security approaches that seek to address climate change and specific human-caused environmental degradation. This is a potential whole of government opportunity that could be a way to breakthrough on specific elements of data sharing, intensified SAR and HA/DR cooperation, and even oceanic technology joint efforts.
- Political tensions in Pakistan are escalating, raising domestic security concerns as well as potential complications for U.S.-Pakistan relations. Pakistan's economic downslide in recent weeks with weakening currency and fears of default plus increased political polarization pushes the country towards a dangerous point. The new coalition government is under severe stress from ousted political opposition led by former and disgruntled prime minister Imran

Khan. However, a recent meeting between Pakistan's new foreign minister and U.S. Secretary of State on the sidelines of a UN conference in New York (and consequent diplomatic readouts) indicates an improvement of the bilateral relationship.

• Afghanistan: Hardliner and conservative Taliban sections are gaining more strength vis-a-vis relatively moderate and young Taliban, as evident from the introduction of harsher policies. Islamic State (Khorasan) is also gaining more strength and now posing a severe security challenge to the Taliban. The new Taliban government is also facing mounting financial and humanitarian challenges.

Armenian National Defense Research University Strategy Seminar

From 11–14 April 2022, NESA Center Academic Dean Dr. Roger Kangas, NESA Center Professor Dr. Gawdat Bahgat, and NESA Center Professor Richard Wiersema conducted a Strategy Seminar with thirty members of leadership and faculty at the Armenian National Defense Research University (NDRU) in Yerevan, Armenia. The U.S. Office of Defense Cooperation (ODC) coordinated the seminar at NDRU's request. Lectures and discussions were presented and led by the NESA Center team on Developing Defense and Security Policy, U.S. Regional Policy in the Caucasus, Implications for Armenia of Russian-Turkish Influence, Conflict Resolution in the Southern Caucasus, Impacts of the Ukraine War, and Changing Nature of Modern War. The event generated and engaged 26 new NESA Center alumni. Washington Seminar: "Is the U.S. Pulling Out of the Middle East?"

On 21 April 2022, The Near East South Asia Center for Strategic Studies hosted another Washington webinar to explore the security challenges facing the Middle East and South Asia. The U.S. national security strategies, over the past two presidential administrations, have called for more focus on Europe and Asia and less on the Middle East. In the aftermath of the U.S. military withdrawal from Afghanistan and the reduced intensity of Islamic State operations in the region, many observers argue that the U.S. is pulling out of the Middle East. These voices have grown louder since Russia's invasion of Ukraine and China's increasing assertiveness against Taiwan. Is the U.S. really pulling out of the Middle East, or is that claim simply hyperbole? NESA Center Professor Dr. Richard Russell and distinguished scholar-practitioners from the Atlantic Council William Wechsler (Senior Director, Rafik Hariri Center & Middle East Programs) and Kirsten Fontensorse (Nonresident Senior Fellow, Rafik Hariri Center & Middle East Programs) walked us through the strengths and weaknesses of this controversial claim. This seminar explored the enduring issues and values that can reinforce or challenge partnerships around the Middle East region. It took a look at what the Biden Administration policy of "back to basics" looks like on the ground, how this shapes long-term goals and objectives, and what role partner states play in achieving these objectives. The program was led by NESA Center Adjunct Professor Dr. Jennifer Jefferis and NESA Center Associate Professor Dr. Michael Sharnoff and offered a unique forum for discussing strategic issues directly with U.S. government officials, subject matter experts, scholars, and advisors. Forty-one military officials participated in this program with discussions held off-the-record under Chatham House rules of non-attribution. Beyond the Geopolitics of the Quad

From 4 to 6 May 2022, the Near East South Asia (NESA) Center for Strategic Studies, in cooperation with the Daniel K. Inouye Asia-Pacific Center for Security Studies, the National Maritime Foundation, the Australian National University, and the Japanese Institute of International Affairs (Tokyo), conducted a workshop titled "Beyond the Geopolitics of the Quad – a Discussion of Cooperative Options." The workshop focused on how the Quadrilateral Security Review member states can enhance regional security and provide regional common good throughout the Indo Pacific. This was a hybrid event with in-person participants gathered in Bangkok, Thailand, while the remainder appeared via digital connectivity.

Twenty-eight participants from 13 countries took part in the workshop. Participants in the workshop hailed from throughout the Indo Pacific and included military officers, diplomats, subject matter experts, and non-governmental organization representatives. Several themes of the discussions covered were enhanced maritime security, furthering secure digital infrastructure, and advancing environmental security. 


