REGIONAL TRENDS - THE GULF

- All Gulf countries are making substantial progress in gender equality and women empowerment. In the U.S. and around the world, more Gulf women are working in their embassies. The female share in the national labor force is rising, and more Gulf women are participating in NESA Center seminars in Washington, D.C. and worldwide.
- All Gulf states made commitments to reduce pollution and have invested in renewable energy, including hydrogen. The COP meeting in the UAE next November will be a major event.
- · Saudi Arabia is preparing its citizens for normalization with Israel.
 - In recent weeks, several public announcements have reinforced the prospect that Saudi Arabia will one day join the Abraham Accords, or at a minimum, prepare its citizens to recognize Israel's de facto existence.
 - Israeli Foreign Minister Eli Cohen said that he told the Saudis that they should authorize flights from Ben-Gurion International
 - **Airport to Jeddah.** Although Saudi Arabia is not a party to the Abraham Accords, since the agreement was signed in 2020, the kingdom has allowed Israeli airlines to use its airspace for flights to and from the UAE and Bahrain. Authorization for flights extending to other destinations was not granted until July 2022.
 - The United States and Israel have been working on a plan to build a trade land bridge connecting the United Arab Emirates, Saudi Arabia, Jordan, and Israel. Trucks will be able to transport goods through this trade corridor, significantly reducing transportation costs and time. This infrastructure project crosses borders that will start in the UAE, pass through Saudi Arabia, and end at the seaports of Israel, later expanding to Bahrain and

- Oman. An Israeli Ministry official announced that the project could operate even without official normalization.
- Israel's largest solar energy company, SolarEdge, has signed a joint venture with Ajlan & Bros Holding, a major private sector conglomerate in the MENA region, to adopt solar energy in Riyadh. The venture will serve leading facilities in Saudi Arabia and enhance Saudi Crown Prince Muhammed bin Salman's 2030 Vision.
- Gulf states, like the rest of the ME and the broader "global south," have reacted to the war in Gaza. Several Gulf leaders participated in the Cairo Peace Summit (21 October 2023). They condemn the killing of civilians and call for a "political solution" to the conflict. This means a two-state solution, i.e., a Palestinian state in peace with Israel. Qatar has taken a leading role in releasing the hostages. For now, it seems, talks about normalizing relations with Israel have been put on hold.
- After the Hamas terrorist assault against Israel on 7 October 2023, the United Arab Emirates and Bahrain condemned the abduction of Israeli civilians. The UAE also warned Syria not to intervene in the war or to permit attacks on Israel from Syrian territory. Saudi Prince Turki al-Faisal blamed both sides and condemned Hamas for seeking to thwart normalization between Saudi Arabia and Israel.
- Regional leaders have quickly shifted from acknowledging the outrage of the initial terrorist attack on Israel towards condemning the loss of civilian life in the subsequent Israeli attacks on Hamas infrastructure in Gaza.
- The explosion at Ahli Hospital in Gaza is an illustration of the strategic communications challenge facing Israel and by extension the United States. The initial Hamas claim of casualties and Israeli culpability was accepted unquestioningly throughout the region. Subsequent evidence of lower casualties and a possible Hamas origin of the explosion generally have been either ignored or dismissed as fabrication in the public realm.
- In the region, Israel is viewed as the architect and prime actor of any civilian suffering in Gaza. Hamas (and their tactics of embedding military infrastructure in civilian and other protected areas) are generally not discussed.

RJNDC Curriculum Review & 2023 Strategic Planning Meetings

From 8–9 May 2023, The NESA Center Professional Military Education (PME) Team met with leadership and faculty from the Royal Jordanian National Defense College (RJNDC) on their campus outside of Amman, Jordan. During the meetings, both parties finalized a written agreement establishing continuous NESA-RJNDC collaboration supported by the U.S. Military Assistance Program at the U.S. Embassy in Amman and the Jordanian Ministry of Defense. The NESA team, which included Associate Dean Charles Marks, Professor Richard Wiersema, and Outreach and Alumni Coordinator Christopher Muller, also met with leadership and staff at the RJNDC's Military Center for Counterterrorism and Extremism (MCCTE) in Zarqa, Jordan. Together, they reviewed plans for the specialized master's program in Countering Extremism and Counterterrorism Strategies, which is the first program of its kind among Arab countries. https://nesa-center.org/rjndc-curriculum-review-and-2023-strategic-planning-mtgs

Dynamics of Countering Human Trafficking in South Asia & the Gulf Seminar

From 22–25 May 2023, the NESA Center conducted a four-day seminar held in Muscat, Oman. It was designed to help participants assess, analyze, and identify opportunities to effectively counter human trafficking in South Asia and the Gulf and improve regional coordination and cooperation to dismantle illicit networks in the area. The creation, dissemination, and use of standard operating procedures for victim identification and referral to rehabilitation services was a focus of the seminar. The seminar started with a welcome by Course Director Distinguished Professor Dr. Hassan Abbas; NESA Center Deputy Director COL David Lamm, USA (Ret.); and Director of Foreign Issues of Consular Department, Foreign Ministry Sultanate of Oman Tahra Hamood Ibrahim Al-Zadjali. Each day began with a panel presentation from a multinational panel of experts analyzing the nature of the challenge and a guided discussion with the entire group. In the second session of each day, participants learned from practitioners' perspectives and focused on problem-solving analytical tools. On the final day of the workshop, participants collaborated through a guided conversation on utilizing the knowledge gained and analytical skills learned to develop a strategy to counter human trafficking in the region. Negev Forum Regional Security Working Group

On June 5–8, 2023, the Near East South Asia (NESA) Center for Strategic Studies, in support of the Office of the Secretary of Defense for Policy and the Department of State, hosted the first-ever Negev Forum Regional Security Working Group (RSWG) regional security seminar in Washington, D.C. The seminar provided a venue for participants from Bahrain, Egypt, Israel, Morocco, the United Arab Emirates, and the United States to discuss shared interests, identify new areas for cooperation, and strengthen their partnerships. NESA Center Associate Professor Dr. Michael Sharnoff, Adjunct Professor Dr. Jennifer Jefferis, Associate Dean Charles Marks, and Professor Richard Wiersema led the seminar, which included over 30 officials from across the defense, security, and diplomatic establishments of the Negev Forum partners. The three-day program included seminar sessions focused on different regional security issues and a tabletop exercise, where the participants worked together to respond to realistic events that could affect their individual and collective security. 2023 NESA-AFRICOM Changing Nature of Security, Capacity, & Institutions Workshop

From 11–16 June 2023, the Near East South Asia (NESA) Center for Strategic Studies conducted, in partnership with U.S. Africa Command, the "NESA-AFRICOM Changing Nature of Security, Capacity, and Institutions Workshop" in Casablanca, Morocco. Security discussions on capacity building and the increasing challenges of transnational threats (trafficking, migration, and pandemics) and non-traditional security challenges (climate and water) have challenged traditional concepts of threats and redefined security. It has also brought into question how best to design and organize institutional capacity and, more specifically, security sectors for today's demands while leveraging technologies for their success in the future. As one examines the changing global trends and their impact on security, the changing nature of threats must also be addressed to include how countries and security forces will hedge capability and capacity development. There were 37 participants from 11 countries across North Africa, the Sahel, and select other African countries.
